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### **US Supreme Court rules on North Carolina Dental Board vs FTC**

The U.S. Supreme Court ruled (6-3) on Wednesday that the North Carolina Dental Board, made up of mostly dentists, illegally suppressed competition when they told non-dentists to stop offering teeth-whitening services.

The court sided with the FTC saying: "Because a controlling number of the board's decision makers are active market participants in the occupation the Board regulates, the Board can invoke state-action immunity **only if** it was subject to **active supervision** by the State, and here that requirement is **not** met." The court went on to add: "This conclusion does not question the good faith of state officers but rather is an assessment of the structural risk of market participants' confusing their own interests with the State's policy goals."

The Court went on to state: "There is no evidence of any decision by the State to initiate or concur with the Board's actions against the non-dentists." Further, "The Act delegates control over the practice of dentistry to the Board, but says nothing about teeth whitening."

On the argument that allowing this FTC order to stand would discourage dedicated citizens from serving on state agencies that regulate their own occupation, the court responded: "This holding is not inconsistent with the idea that those who pursue a calling must embrace ethical standards that derive from a duty separate from the dictates of the State."

In response to the concerns for a definition of “active supervision” by the State, the court responded that it: “... is flexible and context-dependent...and the mere potential for state supervision is not an adequate substitute for a decision by the State. Further, the state supervisor may not itself be an active market participant.”

### **Cheating in the News: How college classes encourage cheating**

James M. Lang wrote an article for The Boston Globe in August 2013 with the subtext, *Our universities motivate students to be dishonest. Here's how to fix them.*

“When the fall semester opens at Harvard University in just a few short weeks, the campus will still be echoing from the cheating scandal last year that saw the suspension of more than 60 students in a government course.

“The scandal grabbed attention because of the shock value of the headline’s pairing: Harvard students and cheating. Most commentators zeroed in on the students—apparently lazy and dishonest, for all their talent—or on the hypercompetitive culture of America’s most prestigious university. Still others suggested that cheating has become commonplace in our schools as the result of the increasingly amoral larger society in which they operate...

“In other words, it may be that cheating rates are so high because too many university curriculums and courses are designed for cheating. And, based on current trends in college education, the problem may be about to get worse.”

### **Healthcare Regulatory CEO Group second meeting**

CEOs from the National Council of State Boards of Nursing, National Boards of Pharmacy, Federation of State Medical Boards, Association of State and Provincial Psychology Boards, National Board of Certification in Occupational Therapy, the Association of Social Work Boards, and the Federation of State Boards of Physical Therapy are meeting February 26 & 27 in Washington, DC to focus on various topics to include mobility and collaboration.

### **Board of Directors Report**

Here are the motions from the February 2015 board of directors meeting.

To modify investment policy to reflect a benchmark for total net return that exceeds the All Urban Consumer Price Index by 3%.

*Rationale:* The use of market indexes will apply the current benchmark index to the historical data even though the mix of funds constantly changes. The CPI would be a more consistent measure for current and prior years.

*Fiscal impact:* None

To modify the investment policy to add a “Strategic Global Allocation Manager” as a new investment group and to change the investment allocation guidelines by decreasing the Large Cap and the Mid/Small Cap categories by 5% each and reallocating the total of 10% to the new category.

*Rationale:* This would add to our diversification. Such managers seek out underpriced stocks from throughout the world.

*Fiscal impact:* None

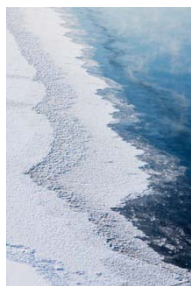
