USCIS Notice of Intent to Terminate (NOID)

As reported in the FCCPT News Flash on September 9th and reviewed in the September 12th Webinar, USCIS has informed FCCPT via letter of August 19, 2016 entitled: "Notice of Intent to Deny and Notice of Intent to Terminate" (NOID) that FCCPT must immediately begin to comply with USCIS's determination to only grant immigration certification to non-US educated physical therapists that:

- hold a post bachelor degree and have a minimum of 202.1 credit hours and a minimum of 90 professional credits effective on or before December 31, 2016
- On or after January 1, 2017, only to those that hold a doctorate degree and have a minimum of 234 credit hours and a minimum of 90 professional credits.

In addition, at the request of USCIS

- FCCPT bylaws have been amended so as to no longer require FSBPT's Board approval. Instead, only a majority vote of the FCCPT Board of Directors is required.
- FSBPT Board of Directors will no longer appoint or remove FCCPT Board members. Instead, FCCPT Board will be self-perpetuating.

FCCPT has responded on September 20th of its compliance with USCIS's request and its willingness to comply with any additional conditions. FCCPT has respectfully requested that USCIS engage in a discussion of the assumptions underlying the agency's conclusions reflected in the NOID. CAPTE and the

American Physical Therapy Association have sent letters of opposition to the NOID (and in support of the CWT) to USCIS Director Leon Rodriquez. If you feel this is an important issue to you and your licensing board and only as appropriate, please contact your Federal Senators and Representatives; and consider writing a letter of opposition to USCIS Director Rodriquez.

Excellence in Regulation Award Goes to Kentucky

This new annual award recognizes the jurisdiction that has made significant accomplishments towards increasing public protection for its consumers of physical therapy services. Kentucky's contributions included adopting telehealth regulation for physical therapy, spearheading efforts to pass antisolicitation legislation designed to reduce fraudulent billing practices; supporting FSBPT's Continuing Competence Model through use of aPTitude, ProCert and oPTion; receiving a 5 star rating on the FSBPT Exam Licensure and Disciplinary Database participation three years in a row; by vigorously defending dry needling as within the scope of physical therapy, and unanimously voting to adopt the Physical Therapy Licensure Compact. Efforts are underway for passage of compact language in Kentucky's 2017 legislative session.

Practice Review Tools (PRTs) Retirement and oPTion

FSBPT is notifying stakeholders that effective **November 30, 2016** the Practice Review Tools (PRTs) will be retired. Since the launch of the General Practice PRT in 2009 and the Orthopedic Practice PRT in 2010, the content for these assessment tools has become gradually outdated relative to the content outline of the National Physical Therapy Examination (NPTE). Moving forward FSBPT can more nimbly maintain and update <u>oPTion</u>'s content which renders <u>oPTion</u> a more sustainable self-directed assessment tool into the future.

Coming Soon: CWT 6

CWT 6 has been adopted and will go into effect **January 1, 2017**. It is based on the current accreditation criteria that is used by the Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education (CAPTE) and has gone through an extensive validation process. Is your jurisdiction ready for the new? FSBPT will be sending out a survey in the near future to see if your jurisdiction has any special considerations with the implementation of the new tool.

Rationale: As required by USCIS, the sections requiring the FSBPT Board of Directors to approve the FCCPT bylaws and appoint the FCCPT Board have been deleted from the Bylaws. *Fiscal Impact:* None.

To approve the revised Coursework Tool 6 that requires 1050 clinical education hours.

Rationale: This more accurately reflects CAPTE's assumption of 35 clinical hours per week rather than the original assumption of 30 clinical hours per week. *Fiscal Impact*: None.


To approve Kentucky for 2016 Excellence in Regulation Award


