#### The Federation's focus on security continues

You may have heard a lot about cyber-security since May 12<sup>th</sup>, thanks to the WannaCry outbreak that has infected 350,000 victims in over 150 countries. Whether used as Phishing attacks (pronounced "fishing"), as spyware, or as ransomware, the tools used to launch these attacks are becoming more sophisticated and more readily available, according to many in the cyber-security field. The WannaCry attacks were successful partly because they were among the first to combine "worm" tactics (software that spreads from computer to computer without human interaction) with the "ransomware" business model (data is held hostage until a ransom is paid). Worms and ransomware have been prominent for years independently, but the combination enabled the attack to spread rapidly.

Developments like this one continue to emphasize the need for organizations to take a holistic, multilayered approach to security. What has worked in the past from a security perspective may not always work tomorrow.

While the recent outbreak did not impact us, the Federation maintains a keen focus on security and our Information Security Program continues to evolve so we may be in a position to defend against emerging threats.

#### **Committee Updates**

#### **Ethics and Legislation Committee Update**

The Ethics and Legislation Committee met May 19-20, 2017 in Alexandria, VA. The committee members: Chair Larry Ohman (ID), Tina Baum (NV), Jean Bickal (NJ), David Reed (NC), Lana Svien (SD), and Judd Warren (SC), spent two days discussing and exploring issues related to standards of practice and discipline/remediation. The committee's current focus is creating a Model for Disciplinary Guidelines resource for member jurisdictions. The committee has gathered the best available evidence and a survey of guidelines used internationally and domestically.

### **Foreign Educated Standards Committee Update**

The Foreign Educated Standards Committee, Chair Charlotte Martin (LA), Leslie Kesler (NC), Sherise Smith (NC), Tracy Zeh (FL), and Alician Rabena-Amen (CA), met May 7-8, 2017 in Alexandria, VA to discuss current issues related to assuring the competence of non-CAPTE educated PTs and PTAs who want to practice in this country. The committee strives to provide resources to jurisdictions related to the regulation of foreign educated physical therapy providers. The committee has begun development

of a resource for board members and administrators on issues related to licensing and prerequisites for licensing for foreign educated PTs and PTAs. The committee also discussed the criteria for post-graduate clinical experience to supplement a clinical education deficit found through an educational credentials review performed on the CWT 6 and retro tools.

The Physical Therapy Licensure Compact (PTLC) Commission will hold its first full public commission meeting on Wednesday, June 14, 2017 from 1-5 PM EDT via WebEx and telephone conference. #### **FSBPT-APTA Joint Board Meeting**

In April, FSBPT hosted a meeting with representatives from both FSBPT and American Physical Therapy Association (APTA) Board of Directors. The meeting was part of an effort on the part of both organizations, reinstituted last year, to meet at least annually to share strategic initiatives and identify opportunities for support and collaboration. The discussion topics included: the Physical Therapy Licensure Compact; the new NPTE practice analysis; the scope of practice motion going before APTA's upcoming House of Delegates; the Minimum Data Set; The APTA Registry; State Licensing Board Antitrust Coalition; Clinical Education; and, Continuing Competency. Several topics were identified that warranted continued discussion and several others as opportunities for collaboration, which demonstrated the meeting has tremendous value for both organizations.

#### **Board of Directors Report**

This month, to advance the business of the Federation, the board of directors approved the motions listed.

Approve the criteria for post-graduate work experiences to supplement clinical education hours, as described in the *Framework for Considering the non-CAPTE Graduate's Experiences in Licensing*, for use with all of the Coursework retro tools (CWT 1 thru 5).

*Rationale:* In 2016, the Board approved using a maximum of 300 hours of post-graduate work experience to meet a deficit of clinical education hours on CWT6 only. The retro tools were not addressed at that time. This motion allows all CWTs to have the same requirements for post-graduate work experience.

Fiscal Impact: None

From the FSBPT Board of Directors, appoint one Officer and one Director to the Licensing Compact Administrative Services organization (LCASO) board of directors. Current appointment of Nancy Kirsch (President) and Ron Barbato (Director).

Rationale: To fulfill required positions.

Fiscal Impact: None

Appoint one FSBPT board member as the ex-officio liaison to the Physical Therapy Licensure Compact Commission (PTLCC). Current appointment of David Relling.

*Rationale*: To fulfill position as required by the model compact statute.

#### In the News

"Records indicate Bevin to reorganize 39 independent regulatory boards", by Brad Bowman, published in *The State Journal* on May 17, 2017

"Gov. Matt Bevin [Kentucky] plans to reorganize more than 30 independent state regulatory boards, according to a sworn affidavit from the Attorney General's Office, and put them under the supervision of a director hired by the Public Protection Cabinet.

"A lawsuit involving Thomas Elliott, ousted chair of the state pension system's board of trustees, Attorney General Andy Beshear and Bevin on whether the governor exceeded his authority in reorganizing the board and dismissing Elliott before his term expired remains in question. All parties are to reappear in Franklin Circuit Court next Thursday.

"An affidavit in Beshear's most recent court filing in the suit says Bevin is interpreting the same 2016 state statute to reorganize 39 regulatory boards."

"We all know that when the medical board comes up with rules that keep us from doing what we're trained to do, patients suffer. That should be illegal and indeed it is,' said Ann Davis, MS, PA-C, vice president of Constituent Organization Outreach and Advocacy for the AAPA during a presentation on competition advocacy and the FTC."

"A Beaverton man who has a bachelor of science degree in engineering and has repeatedly challenged Oregon's timing of yellow traffic lights as too short was investigated by a state board for 'unlicensed practice of engineering' and fined \$500.

"Now, Mats Järlström has joined with the national Institute for Justice to file a federal civil rights lawsuit against members of the Oregon State Board of Examiners for Engineering and Land Surveying.

"He contends state law and the board's actions that disallow anyone from using the word 'engineer' if they're not an Oregon-licensed professional engineer amount to an 'unconstitutional ban on mathematical debate.""
